Christopher Peacock's custom cabinetry is an unforgettable work of woodwork mastery. From the carefully milled lumber to the meticulous joinery techniques, he creates the best quality cabinetry he possibly can. Peacock's prestigious brand has led him to design for high-profile figures across the globe including nine rooms of cabinetry for President William Jefferson and Secretary of State Hillary Clintons' Chappaqua private residence. Peacock has showrooms all over in the US, Europe, Asia and now two new locations more in Nashville and Boston. Introducing this week's Maker Monday, Christopher Peacock.

Andrew Joseph: If you weren't a designer, you'd be a?

Christopher Peacock: The drummer for Led Zeppelin. The ultimate rock band and a drummer's dream! I actually ended up in the design business because I was working part-time for a design company while making money as a musician.

Andrew: What was your first job?

Christopher: Selling women's sweaters on a market stall in East London. I think that's how I learned how to sell and converse with clients. At any one time, I might have had 10 women around me picking out sweaters and I had to manage selling to them all!

Andrew: What's your biggest fear in life?

Christopher: To not have time to realize the success I know my company can achieve. Every day I wake up I feel like it's the first day of business, and I get excited to get to work and get something going. I feel I never have enough time to follow through on my ideas.

Andrew: What's your current TV obsession?

Christopher: Escape to the Chateau. It's a reality show where a chef and his interior designer wife buy a run-down chateau in France and rebuild it one room at a time. It is such a perfect example of two people following their dream.



In kitchen design, Christopher strives to strike the right balance between form and function. This curated space has the perfect harmony of dark and light tones and a variety of textures.

Andrew: Best advice you'd give your teenage self?

Christopher: Do absolutely everything you did before and don't regret it. If anything, go harder! My mother always said, "life is not a dress rehearsal" and I have always lived by those words.

Andrew: A book that everyone should read?

Christopher: Anything about the life of Winston Churchill. He wasn't perfect, but we could all learn a lot from that man. Growing up in England in his local constituency, I was surrounded by memories of his wartime years and his courage and conviction to lead the country, and that has had a great effect on me.

Andrew: Favorite tea to decompress, and in what mug?

Christopher: Barry's Tea from Ireland. A good strong "cuppa" with milk. The mug is thick and heavy. I probably drink 5 cups of tea a day and could not live without it, and it literally works in any situation.

Andrew: What were the last 3 things you panic bought on Amazon?
